- Journals should include at least one entry about specific topics.



Stereotypes and Politics

- Stereotypes of Americans
 - Superficial, happy/smiley, not truthful, not smart, eat a lot of fatty foods, ignorant of/ not interested in other countries, school system isn't good, exaggerate a lot, gullible, too cheerful/ fake, cocky, have an opinion about everything, cowboys, religion over culture, arrogant, loud, friendly, easy to talk to, say "like" a lot,
 - Racism, police brutality, extreme patriotism
- Your role as Ambassador for Albion, and the U.S.
- Political conversations may not be taboo, and not personal. <u>Start a conversation</u>
- Know the culture of "demonstrations" and protests.
- ▶ Terrorism, Major Events. Emergency Response.

Enroll in STEP, Emergency Response

- ▶ Free U.S. State Department Service
- Allow the U.S. Embassy contact you in an emergency, whether natural disaster, civil unrest, or family emergency.
- Help family and friends get in touch with you in an emergency.
- Receive important information from the Embassy about safety conditions in your destination country.
